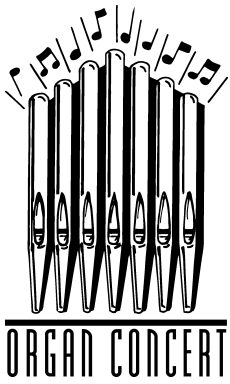

Summertime Music



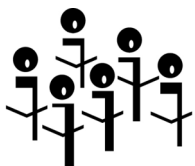
Organ Recital Sunday, June 12 7:00 pm

Message from Pastor Anita Beste



Energy!

I've been witnessing lots of new energy around Prince of Peace lately, and I suspect that maybe you have too. Here's just a few of the more recent ones:

- On May 17 – Syttende Mai, Norwegian Independence Day – we hosted 700 people who came from far and wide for a delicious smorgasboard. The energy spread across the generations: some of our older women planned the event and made it happen. But in the process, they also taught the youth to make lefse, and invited the children to create colorful napkins and set the tables.
- Grassroots interest generated a Men's Group which now meets the 1st and 3rd Saturdays of every month.
- The ministry of music feeds our souls: through the children's musical May 15, All-Choir worship on May 22, and the special concert Kenny is planning for June 12.
- The congregation has been actively engaged around the opportunities and challenges of the transition and budget process.
- People are really ready to fix the roof and be wise stewards of our building. The garden is tilled and the VBS kids are excited to plant – and weed – again. The Capital Improvement Task Force and the South Property Task Force have both begun their work.
- Outdoor Wednesday Evening Worship is happening this summer all because one parishioner wondered if we could offer a meditative worship in the park.
- Children's Ministry Committee is asking for retreats to help families grow in faith together.

The energy is wonderful—and contagious!

We could say it's just because it's spring. But I believe more is at work. I believe the God of Easter and Pentecost is at work among us. The God of resurrection is stirring us into new life and God's Spirit is gifting us with new energy and ideas for our mission and ministry together. We have been through a lot together: three years of conflict, then three years of walking with a dying pastor, then this past year of transition. Through it all, God's presence has been with us as a source of guidance and strength, and a power for mutual forgiveness and hope. Challenges remain, of course—like how to fund the deferred maintenance on our building while also funding our ongoing ministries. But opportunities abound as well—like how to harness all the good energy and ideas stirring in God's people here at Prince of Peace, how to best be a part of God's mission out in the world, and how to invite others in the community to be partners in ministry with us.

You individually, are blest. And we, together, are blest—to be a blessing to others! May the Spirit lead us more and more into that blessing! Amen.

Message from Pastor Gordon Peterson

On Vitality – Practice, Practice, Practice



"How do you get to Carnegie Hall?" is a question visitors often ask. Old-time New Yorkers often answer with a joke: "Practice! Practice! Practice!"

Just the other day, a pastor sent me an email and asked my thoughts on healthy, vital congregations. The congregation, according to my friend, is anxious about a number of things, including: declining numbers (members and financial support); difficulty in finding ways into a changing neighborhood and community; building their capacity to reach out to younger people and to grow a congregation that is more diverse and representative of those living in the area. My friend knows there are no quick fixes when it comes to addressing the challenge of being church in the 21st century, but she would still like one – yesterday!

I sent a quick and brief email from my iPhone and paraphrased an old joke. I typed: *The way to a healthy, vital congregation is practice, practice, practice.* My friend has not responded to my email. I'm sure she thought I was not being very helpful or humorous.

I need to call my friend to say more about what it just may take for the congregation to become a healthy and vital congregation in the 21st Century. When I do speak with her, I'm going to share some thoughts from a Methodist Bishop. In 2007, Reverend Robert Schnase wrote *Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations* (Abingdon Press).

Here is what he wrote in the Introduction. "Radical Hospitality. Passionate Worship. Intentional Faith Development. Risk-Taking Mission and Service. Extravagant Generosity. People are searching for a church shaped and sustained by these qualities. The presence and strength of these five practices demonstrate congregational health, vitality, and fruitfulness." If my friend would evaluate her congregation using these five qualities, I wonder what she would discover. I'm guessing she would find the congregation struggling with one or more of these qualities that "demonstrate congregational health, vitality and fruitfulness."

If you were to take a good look at Prince Peace using as a lens these five qualities, what do you think you would discover? Are we a healthy, vital and fruitful congregation? Is there any room for improvement? If there is, then we might want to sit-down and talk about how we might become even more healthy, more vital and more fruitful in our life together.

One more thing, Bishop Schnase seems to believe that "Vibrant, fruitful, growing congregations are those that naturally practice these qualities and constantly seek ways to develop them further." In other words, practice, practice, practice! I think I'll give my friend a call and recommend that we read this book together and see where it might lead.

Let ev'ry instrument be tuned for praise; let all rejoice who have a voice to raise; and may God give us faith to sing always: Alleluia!*

Notes from our Organist—Kenny Vigne



Christ the Lord is risen indeed! Alleluia! As I released the last chord of the Easter Sunday postlude, turned off the organ, and began unknitting the laces of my organ shoes, I began to reflect on my previous year as a church musician, which brought me very interesting memories.

I remember the welcome that the church had prepared for me, and little bits of my first speech. I am happy to report that nobody has ever interrupted one of my postludes, and that I have never been on fire. I remember the first time Joyful Noise tried to teach me the song "I am slowly going crazy." I remember playing my first band led service, and having my hands go completely numb because I'd never played a praise song before. Of course, I also remember every time I screwed up a hymn, all the times I'd wish I'd chosen different service music, and all the Sundays I'd wished I'd simply practiced more.

All of this eventually culminated in a single stunning revelation: Prince of Peace is the first church that I've ever served as the principal organist. It's been a crazy journey. Thank you for the honor and privilege of serving you, and being a part of my journey.

Don Oberdorfer
On *The Grand
Design***

Don Oberdorfer will lead a book study on Stephen Hawking's book, *The Grand Design* on June 8 and June 15 from 8:00 to and 9:30 pm. This book is an insightful but rather egotistical examination of the creation of all things without acknowledgement of the need or involvement of our God, or any God. It traces the history of physics while adding Dr. Hawking's rather opinionated ideas to a discussion of where our world, our cosmos and the entire heavenly host comes (came) from.

Led by Don Oberdorfer, a man of theology who leans on others to explain physics, this book discussion will meet at church on Wednesday, June 8 and 15 at 8:00 PM. You needn't be either a theologian or a scientist to come. Just show up and snort wisely at appropriate times.

***Council Corner –
Carol Swanson, Council Representative***



Let me share with you what happened at two recent committee meetings. Each had guests that offer Prince of Peace new possibilities in ministry.

On Wednesday, April 27, the Social Concerns committee had a timely and promising meeting with Carol Zierman from Heading Home Minnesota. This organization is a coordinated public-private partnership to end homelessness in Minnesota. One of its goals is to create a network of information of what is being done by "philanthropic, business, faith, civic, nonprofit, and public sectors who are deeply concerned about the plight of homeless youth, adults, and families with children in our communities." Carol Zierman has met with fifteen faith communities in the northern suburbs of Ramsey County to find out what kinds of requests churches are getting and what programs they are already involved in. Pastor Anita shared the types of calls we get in the office, mostly asking for money for food or gas, rarely for rent. We refer people to helping agencies. We also told her the programs which POP is involved in: Habitat for Humanity, Women Achieving New Directions, Going to Galilee for Project Home, Listening House, and the food shelf. Carol Zierman will email POP a summary of those first fifteen groups and then a final report when her interviews are finished. This will provide us with a referral list for those who need help as well as a better idea of what other faith groups around us are doing. It may provide new opportunities for us to serve our community better and more efficiently as we network with others. At the March Global Missions committee meeting, we discussed redirecting our designated mission budget from the Haugs in Europe to more work in Africa. On Tuesday, May 3, Dr. Ron and Ingrid Eggert spoke to the Global Missions Committee, showing slides of their work in Arusha, Tanzania. Self-supporting missionaries from Falcon Heights, the Eggerts have been working in Arusha every other year with Dr. Mark Jacobson. They told us about several programs located at Selian Lutheran Hospital, Selian Orthopedic Institute, and Arusha Lutheran Medical Centre. All these program have been approved for funding by Global Health Ministries:

1. The general operating expenses of Arusha Lutheran Medical Centre (ALMC).
2. The ALMC "Plaster House" where children can stay until their cast is removed and therapy finished. Because they are in a rented house and often overcrowded, there is a plan to build a new Plaster House. Donations are matched by the African Mission Healthcare Foundation.
3. ALMC Orthopedic Institute. Ron explained how Skeletal Fluorosis, caused by the region's drinking water, can cause deformities in the bones of children. Surgery at the Orthopedic Institute is life-changing for these families.
4. Educational programs for training medical workers and doctors. There is only one doctor for every 100,000 people in Tanzania.

The Global Missions Committee will be considering these exciting new possibilities. Please share your opinions. I can be reached at carol.swanson@princeofpeace.tc.

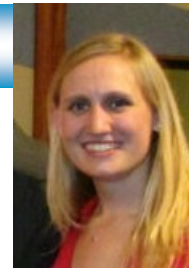

Flowers from the Spirit

In youth group we have talked a little bit about what a year of transition this has been for them. Our lives are always full of transition, but this year the transition has been labeled right in front of us in the form of position titles: Interim pastor for transition, call committee forming to look for a new pastor, interim youth minister. And now as we enter summer we are also entering the transition time for everyone on the academic calendar: transitioning to a new grade, perhaps transitioning into a new school, or graduating and setting out on a great new adventure. We also have new students confirmed, who are now transitioning into being full members of the congregation and into the senior high youth group. We also just finished a liturgical season which, in a way, celebrates transition. Christ is risen from the grave but his time with the disciples in his resurrected form seems to be more of an interim position. As we heard Christ empowered the disciples, including Thomas, Christ then talked to the men on the road to Emmaus, and Christ sent Peter to ‘feed his sheep,’ all of these appearances Christ was in a sense helping the disciples transition from a time of following him in the flesh to following him with the Spirit’s guidance after he leaves them.

This is the time we continue to live in, a time of discerning how the spirit is at work guiding us and leading us to follow God’s will for us in the world. Transition and change can be exciting, but it can also be terrifying. But the promise that Christ has given us is that the Holy Spirit is present to guide us and lead us, even in (perhaps especially in) these times of uncertainty. But how do we know how the Spirit is guiding us? The apostle Paul talks about the fruits of the spirit: love, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentle-

ness and self-control. These are characteristics which describe how the spirit works, so that when we see those ‘fruits’ in the world around us we can identify them as the Spirit’s work and guiding.

I have seen the spirit at work in my life and through stories from others recently. This past week I received some flowers through the mail, 100 rose buds to be exact! But the note saying who they were from simply said, “God is in control! Blessings, The Angelic Host.” I was initially really surprised, and to be honest a little taken aback to get flowers from ‘the angelic host!’ I later found out who had sent them, but this little note was a reminder to me, that the Spirit is truly at work in this world and through other people. With these flowers I found love; a message of patience during a time of transition in my life as I finish school and wonder what is next; I found kindness and generosity in the thought of sending them; and I found faithfulness that the sender wanted to remind me of God’s presence! The Spirit often works through people around us. In this time of great transition, it is my hope that you, too, may know the fruits of the spirit working in your life and guiding you.

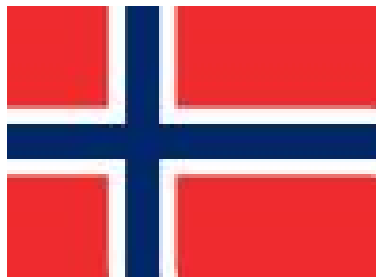
